Orchids, Ric Rac Cactus, String of Hearts, Hoya Heart, Bromeliad, Holiday Cactus, Majesty Palm, Pinstripe Calathea, Peacock Plant, Prayer Plants, African Violets, Haworthia, Echeveria, Parlour Palm, Boston Ferns, or African Violets

Instead of

Lily, Daffodil, Azalea, Lenten Rose, Hyacinth, Poinsettia, Pine Tree, Amaryllis, and Holly

Plants are the 8th most reported pet toxin.

Over 233,000 cases of potential animal poisonings are reported per year. Plants account for 6% of all poison incidents.

Keep out of reach

The best thing to do is to keep all your plants out of reach to avoid your fluffy companion from eating them. After all, they are meant to grow in your home, not be an alternative snack when you are not present.



Avoid purchasing toxic plants

Toxic plants can cause gastrointestinal issues, lethargy, and even more health problems in pets.

The most purchased plants that are toxic to pets are Azaleas, Oleander, Poinsettia, and certain palm plants.

Some other potentially toxic flowers:

Calla Lily, Carnation, Chrysanthemum, Daffodil, Dahlia, Freesia, Gladiola, Hyacinth, Hydrangea, Iris, Lily of the Valley, Ranunculus, and Tulip.



Avoid unnecessary risk by choosing plants that are friendly to both cats and dogs in case their curiosity gets the better of them.
